B.A. (Hons/Hons with Research) – Political Science

## 1. NATURE AND EXTENT OF THE PROGRAM

The purpose of the B.A. Programme in Political Science (Hons./ Hons. with Research) is to introduce and assess the conventional as well as contemporary approaches to understand politics with a purpose of practicality and employability. The course familiarizes students with central debates in Indian and Western political theory and develop critical and analytical skills among students and the development of their understanding to some of the key concepts in political practices. In 8 semesters, they will learn Indian Political Thought & Theory, World Politics, Indian Constitution, Government and Politics, Indian Foreign Policy, Public Policy, Comparative Politics, Political Journalism, & Political Behavior.

The B.A. Programme in Political Science aims to provide students with both a conceptual and practical understanding of the discipline, along with its applicability in the real world, thereby enhancing their future employability. The course is curated in such a way that students will explore a wide range of topics within political science, including foundational subjects such as political theory and thought, international relations, comparative politics, public policy, and Indian government and politics. Additionally, unique courses like 'Political Journalism' and 'Political Behaviour' will equip them with specialized skills to meet the multidimensional demands of the job market.

The fourth year of the programme is dedicated to research, enabling students to learn research methodology and undertake their own projects. Along with Discipline-Specific Core (DSC) courses, students will take Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) each semester to further enrich their knowledge with applicability and employability. These include learning foreign language (German/ Spanish/ French), content writing, SPSS training, CSAT preparation, and field-learning techniques.

Students in the Political Science Programme will have a wide range of option for their Minor courses, Multidisciplinary Courses (MDC), Value Added Courses (VAC), and Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC) courses from a range of university-wide options. Minor courses they can choose from Sociology or International Relations subjects provided in the BA Sociology and BA International Relations programme. Value Added Courses (VAC), Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC), and Multidisciplinary Courses (MDC) courses they can choose from a range of university-wide options. For a four-year program, students need 80 credits in their major, while a three-year program requires 60 credits.

The Learning Outcomes-Based Curriculum Framework (LOCF) is designed to align with contemporary academic and professional requirements, ensuring that students are well-prepared for both higher studies and employment opportunities.

The BA (Hons/ Hons. with Research) in Political Science programme empowers students to explore the politics of state, government and other multi-national actors in domestic as well as international politics, offering Political Theory, Comparative

Politics, Political Journalism and Political Behaviour specialisations, culminating in a research-focused program. Students can have major or minor in the above-explained specialisation. Additionally, students can also have minor specialisations in the courses offered by our Faculty like Sociology, International Relations, and Economics depending on the courses' availability and fulfilling credit requirements of 28 credits. The program is embedded with choice of Generic Electives i.e., outside their core discipline, along with choice-based value-added courses (VAC) and Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC) available on the university basket.

The program offers avenues to the students to enter and exit from certificate, diploma three-year degree, four four-year degree with research and finally, the opportunity to integrate with a one-year master's program as per recommendations of National Education Policy 2020. This program is envisaged to be conducted in accordance with Bloom's Taxonomy pedagogy. The layout of all the courses in the program is structurally designed with three levels of thinking and each course learning outcomes have been mapped with program outcomes.

The course has been designed as per the National Education Policy guidelines and has some specific features, including:

- 1. Students exiting the program after earning 44 credits in Semesters I and II will be awarded a Certificate in Political Science. Exiting after 88 credits, at the end of Semester IV, will earn a Diploma in Political Science. Completion of 132 credits by the end of Semester VI qualifies a student for a Bachelor of Arts in Political Science, with the major and minor fields specified. For students who continue through Semester VIII, completion of 176 credits will result in a Bachelor of Arts in Political Science (Honours with Research) if a dissertation is completed, or a Bachelor of Arts in Political Science (Honours) if not. Both major and minor fields of study will be mentioned, provided the student has earned the required credits in each area
- 2. Each year's curriculum, with two semesters each, has been designed so that after completion of each level, the student can have a complete set of information with specific academic components.
- 3. The emphasis on practical training through internship meaningfully designed courses has been given for skill development.

## 4. QUALIFICATION DESCRIPTORS:

- □ Systematic knowledge and understanding of an academic field: Students will gain a broad foundation in Political Science with specialisation in political theory and thought, international relations, comparative politics, public policy, and Indian government and politics. Additionally, unique courses like 'Political Journalism' and 'Political Behaviour'. They will develop a critical understanding of core theories, principles, and current issues within each chosen specialisation.
- □ Procedural knowledge for different professions: The program equips students with transferable skills applicable to various professions in research, government, public service, and non-profit sectors. Specialisation courses will introduce students to the practices and methodologies used by professionals in their chosen field (e.g., political analysis, journalistic research, or study of political behaviour).
- □ Skills in areas related to specialisation: Our Political Journalism & Political Behaviour specialisation equips political science students with the research, analysis, and critical thinking skills needed to understand political behaviour on a global scale. Students explore core concepts in political science like political theory and thought, international relations, comparative politics, public policy, and Indian government and politics and delve into the political factors driving state and government. Through this unique program, graduates gain expertise for tackling complex challenges in today's interconnected world.
- □ Comprehensive knowledge of scholarly materials: Students will be exposed to current research, scholarly literature, and data analysis methods specific to Political Science. The program equips students to identify and critically evaluate sources in their field.
- □ **Information gathering and data analysis:** Students will develop skills to identify information needs, collect relevant data (both quantitative and qualitative), and analyse it using appropriate methodologies. Depending on the subject, this could involve analysing political polls, political events, or public policy.

- □ **Critical thinking and problem solving:** The program emphasises critical assessment of complex issues and ideas within the political sciences. Students will learn to apply their knowledge and understanding of political conflict, comparative politics, and international relations.
- □ Communication of research results: Students will be equipped to communicate their findings effectively, both in writing and orally, using the terminology and concepts specific to their chosen specialisation. This could involve writing research papers, presenting findings at conferences, or creating policy briefs.

## Discipline Specific Core (DSC)

Discipline-specific core courses refer to subjects that form the essential foundation of an academic program or major within a broader discipline. These courses provide students with the core knowledge, skills, and methodologies specific to their chosen field. This includes Foundation of Indian Politics, Understanding World Politics, Political Journalism, Political Behavior, Indian Constitution & Public Policy, Comparative International Politics, Research Methodology.

#### **Minor**

Minor allow students to delve deeper into their chosen field. Unlike core courses that provide foundational knowledge, Minors enable students to explore specific areas of interest within their major. This includes Sociology, International Relations and Economics.

#### Multidisciplinary Courses (MDS)

Multidisciplinary Courses is credited and choice-based. The students choose from a pool of MDCs offered by the Faculty under the University. (Reference: University Umbrella Multidisciplinary Courses)

#### Value Added Courses (VAC)

Value Added Courses is credited and choice-based. The students choose from a pool of VAC offered by the Faculty under the University. (Reference: University Umbrella Value Added Courses)

## Ability Enhancement Compulsory Course (AEC)

Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses is credited and choice-based. The students choose from a pool of AEC offered by the Faculty under the University. (Reference: University Umbrella Ability Enhancement Compulsory Course)

## Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC)

Skill Enhancement Course is compulsory and it is credited. For the BA Political Science programme, we are offering following SECs aligned with the specialisation of that Semester –Content Writing, SPSS, and Video Making.
